Circa 2014, two Sunrise Amel corn snake mutants at around three months of age. One is obviously a Sunrise Amel Tessera. The SUNRISE mutation name derives from how dramatically (and quickly) they change from looking pale and lackluster, to being predominantly red-orange Amels (parallel to the transformation of a morning sunrise beginning with a blush of color, followed by deeply rich colors). The piercing orange color exhibition seen here will not last long. In mere weeks both of these snakes will appear-color wise-to be essentially classic Amel corns. Strong red will nearly supplant the orange color zones a few months later, continuing to saturate through maturity. I should have 2018 hatchling Sunrise Amel corns for sale later this summer.
